

> The program is offered to children of Lake and Sumter counties and includes children with Down's Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, brain damage, and those at risk from prematurity or substance abuse or overall delay in development. In addition to home visits, the children spend two days a week at the center which is located at 9642 U.S. Highway 441 in Leesburg.

### ONE PERSON COUNTS IF EVERY ONE VOTES

Did you vote in the primary on September 3rd and in the run-off on October 1rd? The results of those elections, as you know, determined which candidates will appear on the November ballots.

Soon after settling in, they became P.O.A. members due to past involvement with similar organizations and the realization of the importance of having representation.



SILENT DANGER IN SWIMMING POOLS

A few weeks ago 20/20 presented a segment on "The Silent Danger in the Pool". It pertained, in part, to a dangerous situation which results from the condition of grates through which water flows out of pools with great force. Grates may break down due to age, become dislodged or may not have been properly secured. Two heartbreaking incidents were cited

which occurred in a <u>wading pool</u> and involved a two-year-old boy and an 11-year-old girl. In each case, they were sucked against the grate. The suction pulled the boy's intestines out through his anus. The girl lost a portion of her intestines the same way. Both are on machines today.

Similar incidents occur in <u>adult pools</u> and drowning is the most common result. At a graduation party in New Jersey, a 17-year-old female was the victim. Eight men could not pull her free.

#### REGARDING - WATER, SEWER AND AMENITIES FEES


