Tonight's speakers are Don Henderson, CEO of the Villages Hospital, and Michael Pittman, Site Manager. Their presentations focused on the history of the hospital, important statistics, and achievements. Of interest to residents was the discussion of the star ratings with our hospital receiving one star. JACHO, (Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Hospitals Organizations), has a complex history of applying star rating to hospitals. According to Henderson it is difficult if not impossible to understand how and where these ratings come from and what they really mean. What it is important, according to Henderson is to know is that our hospital will continue to provide quality service to our residents and that a one star rating can be the result of the age of the general population the Villages admits for treatment compared to a general hospital in other parts of the country.

Achievements of interest and recognition awarded to the hospital include certification for excellence in their programs in treating cancer, strokes, pain management, and joint replacements.

The POA plans on inviting hospital representatives to update us on the progress of our hospital on an annual basis.
